# Course Objective

English 3201 is an academic course, designed for the majority of students entering Level III. Students participate in practical and engaging learning experiences as they navigate increasingly complex and sophisticated texts. English 3201 emphasizes the study and creation of literary texts and is intended to enable students to respond personally, critically, and creatively.

#### Students will:

- Analyze and evaluate content, style, and stylistic techniques in a variety of texts
- Create a variety of increasingly complex texts for a wide range of audiences and purposes

- Develop and justify an increasingly sophisticated interpretation of texts
- Express themselves precisely and clearly using a variety of text forms

#### Course Evaluation

The following evaluation reflects <u>60%</u> of the students' final mark in this course. Students will also write a **public examination** that is worth 40% of their final mark. In an effort to help ensure that students are prepared for this examination, we will be using the scoring scales used by the Provincial Marking Board to grade demand writing pieces.

• Tests, essays, demand writings, projects, and in-class activities will be included in this category.

#### Representing 10%

Projects and in-class activities will be included in this category.

#### Reading 14%

• Tests, projects, quizzes, and in-class activities will be included in this category.

#### Viewing 14%

• Tests, projects, quizzes, and in-class activities will be included in this category.

### Speaking 11%

Speeches, presentations, projects, and in-class activities will be included in this category.

#### Listening 10%

Quizzes and in-class activities will be included in this category.

## Assessment Policy

Students are expected to submit assignments on the assigned dates. If students miss assessments (tests or assignments) for VALID reasons, the following expectations should be met:

- ✓ Submit the missing assignment on the new date assigned by the teacher (within 3 days)
- ✓ Complete the missing test or in-class assignment on the first class back after the absence
- ✓ Make alternate arrangements for assessments when the absence is planned during the time of a test or assignment due date

Parents or guardians will be required to send an email or letter that includes the reason for a student's absence in order for it to be deemed VALID.

If students miss assessments (tests or assignments) for INVALID reasons, the following protocol will be followed:

- ✓ A mark of 0 will be entered as a placeholder
- ✓ Parents/guardians will be notified
- ✓ An alternate date or assessment <u>may</u> be assigned
- ✓ Mark deduction will occur for each day the assessment is late (15% deducted after 1 day, 10% more after 2 days, 5% more after 3 days, and a score of 0% will be entered after 4 days)

### Academic Honesty

Academic dishonesty will result in a mark of 0. Academic dishonesty occurs when a student copies information directly from another source (without properly citing the source) or from another student. This behavior is not acceptable with ANY form of assessment (i.e. tests, quizzes, class activities, work sheets, portfolios, assignments).

## Appropriate Use of Technology

All hand-held devices should be placed in lockers or book bags, and should NOT be stored in, on, or under any desks. These devices may be used for research, activities, and/or for music only if permitted by the classroom teacher. If a student does not follow these guidelines, the following consequences will ensue:

- ✓ 1<sup>st</sup> incident: Warning
- ✓ 2<sup>nd</sup> incident: Suspension of school Wi-fi privileges for a week
- ✓ 3<sup>rd</sup> incident: Parents will be notified, phone will be brought to the office, and school Wi-fi
  privileges will be suspended for 3 weeks


